First full week of the Legislative Session concludes

Today is Day 10 of the Legislative Session and more than 1300 bills have been introduced in the Legislature. Your continued grassroots effort out in the field enhances our work at the State Capitol so please continue your outreach to legislators on HB 2007, the Governor's CON Repeal bill (see below). Also, please check out the Legislature's website for information about your legislator(s) and their committee assignments along with streaming and audio of floor sessions and committee meetings. Continued Call to Action on CON in the House

Action involving HB 2007, the Governor's CON Repeal bill, heated up this week with the first round of testimony to members of the House Health Committee. A 5-hour meeting yesterday included testimony by WVHA representatives Candace Miller, CEO, WVU Medicine, Jackson General Hospital and David Goldberg, President & CEO, Mon Health, and Executive VP, Vandalia Health. Both provided excellent testimony and a unified voice on the issue, while also responding to a series of legislator questions. Thank you to Candace and David and the many hospital CEOs, administrators, and staff who came to the Capitol for the hearing and to meet with legislators. It's critically important to continue the face-to-face meetings that we've all been having with lawmakers this week. We're hearing this is one of the most effective strategies in our advocacy.

CALL TO ACTION: A vote on the bill in the House Health Committee is expected Monday at 3:00 p.m. If you would like to come down to the Capitol for this meeting, please let me, Jim or Brandon know. We're requesting all member hospitals continue to engage in our support to protect and preserve CON. **Please contact your Delegate immediately and ask them to VOTE NO ON CON REPEAL and HB 2007.** It's important that legislators hear from their local hospital constituents so please encourage your senior management staff to contact legislators. Also, please continue to engage your local governments as well as the business community, particularly since the WV Chamber of Commerce this week has also weighed in with legislators in opposition to HB 2007. Other speakers during yesterday's meeting included: Dr. Arvin Singh, new Cabinet Secretary, Department of Health who spoke in favor of CON Repeal; and representatives of out of state think tanks advocating for free-marking principles including The Cicero Institute and The Cardinal Institute, who also presented to the Committee, all of these groups theorized the impact of CON on West Virginia health care while using irrelevant out of state

examples and outdated studies to make the case for Repeal. In contrast, WVHA representatives provided real examples of the investments West Virginia hospitals are making to their communities to expand access to care and to meet the needs of West Virginians. Other presenters included: representatives of Memorial Health System in Marietta, OH and Valley Health who spoke in favor of CON Repeal. Melanie Hall, President of the West Virginia Hospice Council spoke about the impact of CON repeal on the hospice industry. The Senate companion bill (<u>SB 453</u>) has not been acted on and is pending in the Senate Health Committee.

Childhood Immunization bill passes Senate

Today, the Senate passed <u>SB 460</u> relating to childhood immunization requirements by a vote of <u>20-12</u>. The bill now moves over to the House for further consideration.

The bill would allow religious exemptions to the state's school vaccinations if parents or legal guardians object on legal grounds. To qualify for the exemption, families would submit an annual written statement requesting a religious or philosophical exemption about required vaccines. Under SB 460, families who want a religious exemption would submit a written statement to their school or day care administrator saying that the state vaccine requirements cannot be met because they conflict with the parents' or emancipated child's religious or philosophical beliefs. Medical exemptions to vaccine laws would be submitted by a child's medical provider and they would not be subject to approval by the state's immunization officer, a position that would be terminated if the bill becomes law.

If passed, the bill will move West Virginia from having one of the most effective school and childcare immunization requirements in the nation to having one of the weakest. By allowing easy to obtain religious and philosophical exemptions it will become easier and more convenient for parents/guardians to opt their children out of immunizations than to vaccinate them. This will lead to reductions in immunization rates in West Virginia and put children and communities at risk for the return of vaccine-preventable diseases. A coalition of physicians, nurses and other health care providers are continuing to work through the West Virginia Immunization Network to advocate against the legislation.
