Final Hours of 2025 Regular Session

Today is Day 59 of the 60-Day Session – which ends at midnight Sat., April 12th. Although the session hasn't finished, we want to share a few updates. Much of the 2025 Regular Session has involved protecting hospitals and health systems from proposed legislation imposing significant financial, clinical, regulatory, and operational burdens—and the challenge continues in these final hours of the session. Our strategy this session continues: "defense" above all else. Here's the current situation at a glance:

- As we've noted, the WVHA fought off CON Repeal this session and other CON related bills that received attention in the Legislature and with the Governor. The main action included the House Health Committee narrowly **defeating** <u>HB 2007</u>, the Certificate of Need (CON) Repeal by a vote of 13-12 vote (13 opposed to the bill, and 12 in favor) on February 24. We remain vigilant on this topic in the final hours of the session.
- Other notable hospital and health care bills that were not advanced this session as of 4/11/25:

Senate Health Committee Action on Immunization and Committee Chair Comments on Hospitals

Earlier this week, the Senate Health Committee amended <u>HB 2776</u> (dealing with Alpha-gal syndrome) to include provisions of <u>SB 460</u> which relates to vaccine exemptions. This is the bill that was voted down by the <u>House 42-56</u> on March 24. When HB 2776 hit the Senate Floor yesterday, the Senate Health Committee Chair Laura Wakim Chapman changed course, dropping the vaccination exemptions provision from the bill. The bill about alpha-gal syndrome, HB 2776, then passed unanimously. In the evening floor session last night, Chapman elaborated on her position to reverse course, and cited the financial interests of "big medicine and big drug companies" as reasons for the bill's demise.

In her floor speech last night, Chapman also said that the health care bills that were introduced and advanced this session to the House failed because "the reforms eat into big medicine's profit structure." She went on to say that "hospital consolidations and acquisitions are keeping the people of West Virginia in the dark ages for health care. Through those monopolies, the health care profits have almost tripled, however, those profits have not helped West Virginians." She said "collectively, our non-profit hospitals in West Virginia have brought in approximately \$11.5 billion in revenue in 2023 according to ProPublica.org." Other comments focused on executive compensation, health outcomes, health care costs and physician wait times. Among the bills she cited was SB 718 related to hospital price transparency and financial disclosure which passed the Senate 22-12 but did not advance in the House. As we approach the closing hours of the session, please note: all outcomes remain on the table. We'll continue monitoring developments closely.

This includes the State Fiscal Year 2026 Budget in <u>HB 2026</u>. Yesterday, the House passed a \$5.317 billion general revenue budget bill that was characterized as a comprise with the Senate. The Governor initially proposed a \$5.323 billion budget. Over the course of the past couple of weeks, the House and Senate have bounced budget frameworks back and forth. The Senate will now take up the budget bill prior to the conclusion of the session at midnight Saturday. WVHA will be reviewing this latest budget in detail so please be on the lookout for any additional information.

We'll distribute a *Preliminary Wrap-Up* of the Session following its conclusion and then develop a more comprehensive *Summary* in the weeks ahead. We've also scheduled a member-wide *Webinar* for Thu. May 1st beginning at Noon highlighting key bills of interest. Please be on the lookout for this information.
